An Education with Eternity in Mind

Korah, Dathan, Abiram, and On. Ever heard of those names in the Bible?



n Numbers the 16th chapter (verses 1-3), we read the account of these four men. After receiving the tragic news that they would not be permitted to enter into the Promised Land for their repeated grumbling against the Lord, these

four, under the leadership of Korah, instigated 250 others to join them in a coup for control. The plans of Dathan, Abiram and Korah were extinguished by a one-of-a-kind event: the earth opened and swallowed them up. We don't really know what happened to On. (Perhaps he just changed his mind and moved *on*. Sorry, I couldn't resist that!)

Even though Korah was foolish with his own life, his children were protected from his foolishness, and they were not near him on that fateful day. Numbers 26: 9-11 confirms this with these words, "Nevertheless the children of Korah did not die."

God loves His children. Parents and church family, you and I will be held accountable to God for the way we raise them. The decisions we make will, to a great degree, determine their destiny.

You may ask, what became of Korah's children? Did you know that the Sons of Korah are credited with writing 11 of the Psalms in our Bibles? And if you read I Chronicles 6:33-38 you will discover who was a 9th generation descendant, a great-

In her landmark book on the subject of education, Ellen White penned the real mission of the schools of the prophets. I suggest that this is the primary purpose and function of our Adventist schools around the world, including every one of our church schools across North and South Carolina:

"These schools were intended to serve as a

barrier against the wide-spreading corruption, to provide for the mental and spiritual welfare of the youth, and to promote the prosperity of the nation by furnishing it with men qualified to act in the fear of God as leaders and counselors," *Education*, p. 46.

From the dawn of the Advent movement, Seventh-day Adventist education has played a paramount role in the fulfillment of Christ's calling, and His commission to the message and mission of His Remnant church. With humble beginnings in North America, this ministry has encircled the globe to become the second largest parochial school system in the entire world. This was no accident. It has happened over the span of almost 150 years. By the grace of God, it has impacted not only everyone who is a worker for the church, but also a much wider body of believers in virtually every continent on earth.

As a student, I have experienced a one-teacher, multi-grade classroom as well as schools with much larger classrooms. From elementary school, through academy, and on to college and university, I stand today as a witness to the power of Adventist Christian education, both in my personal life and as a lifelong believer and worker for the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

"The subject of education is one that should interest every Seventh-day Adventist. The Lord says to us, Seventh-day Adventists are not to place themselves under the counsel and instruction of teachers who know not the truth for this time," *Counsels to Parents, Teachers, and Students, p.* 401.

God's messenger wanted us to know that, "In the highest sense the work of education and the work of redemption are one."

A few months ago, as we turned our calendars to the month of August, the church school teachers of this conference began the longest ongoing evangelistic campaign of this year. For 180 days—at least 1,080 hours of direct contact a year—these teachers will be guiding and directing the hearts and minds of our children and youth to Jesus Christ as their loving Savior and the Lord of their lives.

Let's continue to uplift our Adventist schools, teachers, parents, and students in our daily prayers. Let's support initiatives such as Touch a Life at MPA, which sponsor precious students who need an education that not only prepares them with knowledge about this life, but keeps eternity in mind.

great new online enterprise for young people is ready to launch! Five new video series, six podcasts, a blog, and a myriad of other social media content is currently being produced for the young people of our conference by the Carolina Conference Communications Department.

As with many other denominations, there has been a growing divide between the younger and older church members in the Adventist Church, and recently those differing views have created tension, a lack of trust and as a result, a loss of communication. We have noticed the absence of young adults within the church, and we want to let them know we miss them and care about them.

We have also created a conferencewide young adult/youth event calendar and an online survey to give us input on the content we should create, and receive feedback on our young people's experiences and interactions with the church and Adventist beliefs. We simply want to get to know them better. If you are a youth/young adult ministry leader, we solicit your support and feedback as well.

We hope Project: ReFRESH will initiate personal conversation and dialogue among all ages everywhere, with the ultimate goal of inspiring revival and reunion within our church family. PRAY AND COMMIT to placing attractive and updated welcome billboards from the Seventh-day Adventist Church at every Interstate entry point into North and South Carolina.

My fellow members, we are now in the second cycle of sharing each

of the seven visionary goals we established at the 2016 Carolina Conference session.

Our second visionary goal is to welcome traveling pilgrims into our Conference territory with attractive and updated billboards that display an invitational greeting from the Seventh-day Adventist Church. The goal is to place these billboards, which include our website, at various interstate entry points into North and South Carolina.

We currently have nine Interstate entry points on East-West bound Interstates 40

and 26, as well as North-South Bound Interstates 77, 85, and 95 in North Carolina. In South Carolina we currently have seven Interstate entry points on East-West bound Interstates 20 and 26 as well as North-South bound Interstates 77. 85, and 95. Based on availability near entry points and reasonable budgetary investments, the administration of the Conference has agreed to enter into two leasing contracts with a commercial firm authorized by the Southern Union Conference for the design work, installation and maintenance of this signage. It is our intent to

move these signs annually as other locations are available. Currently we have a billboard at the entrance to North Carolina on I-95 south bound from Virginia. The second sign is also on I-95, visible as you enter South Carolina from North Carolina.

The photo used on this billboard presents a welcoming church with a multi-ethic and multi-generational approach in its mission and outreach. Why focus on people? Perhaps the words of this song by the three ladies known as Point of Grace say it best: "God loves people more than anything. God loves people more than anything. More than anything, He wants them to know, He'd rather die than let them go, 'cause God loves people more than anything."

Remember that little children's song, This Little Light of Mine?

> "This little light of mine; I'm going to let it shine; All around the neighborhood, I'm going to let it shine. Hide it under a bushel—no! I'm going to let it shine; Let it shine till Jesus comes, I'm going to let it shine."

achel Joyner, a member of the Beaufort Seventh-day Adventist Church in South Carolina, never planned on becoming a welder. When she was in ninth grade, her mother urged her to learn a trade. As a joke, Joyner picked welding but surprised herself by quickly

falling in love with it. She became a certified welder in tenth grade and continued studying welding until her senior year when she worked as the teacher's assistant.

In eleventh grade, she got a job as an intern at Neal's Construction, LLC, about making new friends. One of her teachers suggested an overseas mission trip, and after that she couldn't get the idea out of her head.

"Lots of people kept talking about how they went on mission trips and saw life completely differently when they returned," says Joyner. "I didn't

and enjoyed it so much that she decided to earn a bachelor's degree in construction management at Southern Adventist University. When Joyner first arrived on campus, she was shy, homesick, and unsure of how to go understand what they meant by that, and I wanted to find out."

During spring break of her freshman year, she went with Southern's Evangelistic Resource Center (ERC) to Cancun, Mexico, to preach six sermons. Joyner had always enjoyed public speaking, so she was right in her element as she shared the good news about Jesus, salvation, and life after death. She was astonished at the warm welcome she received and how quickly she bonded with both the locals and her fellow evangelists. After she got home, she finally understood

After Rachel got home, she kept in touch with her friends from Mexico via text and regularly spent time with her Southern mission trip buddies. Now that she had a tight

circle of friends, it was easier to make even more, and she began to feel truly comfortable on campus.

She loved her mission trip experience so much that she wanted to go on another one as soon as possible. So this past summer she went with ERC to Savanna-la-mar, Jamaica, (above, left) where she preached 12 sermons. Currently a sophomore, she hopes to go on a third mission trip during spring break of 2019.

"Although I will graduate in 2020, I want mission trips to remain a big part of my life," says Joyner. "I want to go back to Mexico and Jamaica and rebuild their churches, giving them a sturdy place where they can safely worship. My teachers here

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DIABETES MADE SIMPLE Cooking Class

On June 24, 2018, if you looked into the kitchen of the Irmo Adventist Church in Columbia, SC, you would have seen a group of dedicated women scurrying about, preparing food.

The ladies were getting ready for the Diabetes Made Simple cooking class, presented by Darcy Griffin from Trinity, NC.

Darcy began her journey to eating healthier over 20 years ago, studying and learning how foods affect the body. She took a deeper look at natural healing when diagnosed with multiple food allergies.

Then, in May of 2016, her son, Noah, was diagnosed with type one diabetes. It was a hard adjustment process, and she went through the stages

of grief, just like a person does when they lose a loved one. Darcy and Noah decided that they wanted



to use his diagnosis for good, and began to learn all they could about diabetes.

As they kept track of what Noah

ate, did, and his blood sugar numbers they learned that the typical recommended diet for diabetics was not the best choice. The best foods for diabetes turned out to be low fat, low sugar and plant based.

Darcy's studies led to the creation of *Cooking*

for Diabetes Made Easy, her second cookbook, which then caused her to be invited to the Irmo Adventist Church to conduct a cooking class and share many helpful diabetic tips.

The Irmo members worked hard to prepare for this event, making fliers, registering people, and telling everyone they knew. Soon they had 92 people registered to come. That Sunday evening, people started filing in. Everyone seemed eager, and many chose to sit right up front! Not everyone who signed up, showed up, however 60 people from the community and 14 church members were in attendance.

Attendees sampled the delicious recipes and asked many questions. They were excited to learn more.

When the program was over, attendees approached Griffin to ask more questions. One man came up to her husband, Lee, and said, "I haven't had hope for 25 years...until today." That was worth all the time and effort put into this program. It is what all of us are here for, to give hope to the sick, hurting and lost. This is what Jesus is all about.

Through this ministry, 10 Bible studies were requested through a comment card, and many picked up free materials from a literature table. Truly the health message is the right arm of the gospel.

The catered meal was provided by Eden's Vegetarian, owned by Alexander Forde of Little Creek Adventist Fellowship in Clayton, NC.



Carolina Obituaries

RASMUSSEN, JOSEPH H., 90, born Aug. 2, 1928, in Denmark, died June 18, 2018, in Hendersonville, NC. Joseph received his Bachelor's degree from Emmanuel Missionary College, now Andrews University in Berrien Springs, MI. He then went on to receive his Master's degree in economics from the University of Michigan. He was employed by General Telephone and Electric (GTE), and retired as the director of Management Information Systems in 1993 after giving them 38 years of outstanding service. During his working career, he spent a lot of time traveling internationally, setting up new systems around the world. Joseph was able to speak five languages and was fluent in several of them. He was an elder in his churches in Syracuse, NY, and Bridgeport, CT. He served for a period on the board of directors for Adventist Health Systems. Joseph loved spending time with his family, and was a very generous man who donated to many different organizations. Joe inspired people with the way that he dealt with life with such grace and humor.

TYSON, OLIVE MAY, 94, born Jan. 11, 1924, died May 12, 2018, in Hendersonville, NC. She married James Fulfer on June 7, 1943. Together they served in Barbados, Trinidad and Haiti, where James held leadership positions in church administration. In Haiti, Olive served as a nurse and oversaw

20,000 mothers with starving babies. James and Olive also lived in Guinea. West Africa. where they served in ADRA's programs, feeding 100,000 people in Liberia. They retired in Greenville, NC, then relocated to Fletcher Park Inn. Hendersonville, NC.
